### What makes a Mission Trip successful?

#### **Upon returning from our annual** Soccer Festival in September, I

remember being very unsettled with what the team of 25 had just experienced on that 4-day mission trip.

The confusion became even more clear the next day at church when folks started asking how did the "mission trip" go? I quickly realized that I didn't know how to answer.

At the same time. I needed to be discerning on how I answered the trip. The truth of the matter was that it was "amazing" because of what our team witnessed. However, that might be misleading to someone thinking that it was a rich and fulfilling trip for each person attending. The other truth is that it was one of the most difficult soccer festivals that we've hosted in our seven years of partnership with Casa Samuel. This seemed to lead to other questions of "did someone get hurt" or "did someone get sick"? No.

The trip was full of ups and downs. The festival itself is a two-day event focusing on 300+ children from 5-11 years old as well as a carve out of activities for 50+ mom's that attend a half-day retreat (without their kids!!).

So, just the large volume of kids can be overwhelming and at times, chaotic. Usually, it's in the chaos that everything seems to come together. But it didn't happen that way on this trip.

On the first day, things started out great! The kids were easily checked-in receiving their event t-shirt and immediately shuffled to the turf soccer field, or arts & crafts station, or to the music station. The energy was high and the smiles were abundant.

And then came the snack break which is a "big" part of the day because of the lack of meals in this community. That's when it started raining, not sprinkling but a hard rain

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that did not let up again until the next morning!!

The rain is something rare, not unheard of, just rare, in this area of Mexico so we had to scramble. Quickly

getting all the kids indoors and creatively entertaining them along the way. However, the common response to rain, for the average mom in this community, is to gather your children and keep them home, even if it means missing school. Catching a continues next page **EARS** 

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### Going Deeper by Pat MacPherson

#### A question that I like to ask men

(especially in a small group setting) is "When did the Disciples become disciples?"

What I like about this question is the discussion that follows. Many times I will hear answers such as...

- When they (the disciples) started performing miracles...; or
- When Jesus gave them the Great Commission (Matthew 28: )...; or
- At Pentecost (when the Holy Spirit was distributed/received).

However, through the discussion, it always seems to lead back to when the disciples responded 'I will' to Jesus when asking them

to follow Him. At least this has been my experience.

I bring this up because this belief of when someone becomes a "disciple" has impacted my approach to discipleship. When MAC Ministries first began in 2005, my belief was that discipleship was the process of becoming a disciple. As time went by, I realized that discipleship is the process after becoming a disciple.

The men that I continued to meet one-onone with or through churches would identify themselves as disciples, yet they wanted to go deeper. They wanted to serve God more. They wanted a stronger relationship with Christ.

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cold due to rain exposure is a much serious matter in Renacimiento than Marietta and the response to get your kid and go home quickly ensued.

Within an hour the kids and moms had left for the day and we were left disappointed and discouraged.

As we entered into the second day, the rain came to a stop and the sun started to peak through the clouds. From the moment we arrived at 8 am, we were put to work. First packaging and distributing the weekly vegetable bags for 100 families in the community. And then immediately welcoming and checking in 200 eight to ten year-olds who were ready to play soccer.

Coming off a day of little action (and the feeling of little impact), we were excited to see so many kids....and so many smiles.

By 4 pm, hardly any of us could still stand. The day was exhausting and we were beat! So much so, that I think all of us couldn't wait to get back to the hotel so we could rest.

Although, emotionally, the trip seemed to be down and up. Spiritually, one couldn't ignore the challenge that God was placing before us to stay focused on Him and keep responding with a trust that He had each and every one of us there for a purpose.

The night after the second and last day of the event was truly amazing as we all seemed to experience a similar experience of how God showed Himself even when we couldn't see the impact. As one person pointed out, that each day he walked towards the soccer fields, it reminded him of a church made of people. Although, it didn't look like a church (with no building), there was a joy present and a miraculous fellowship among everyone present even though we weren't sharing/speaking the same language.

We also got the opportunity to hear Pastor Eva share how many of the kids and mom's attending the event come from abused families and struggle when hearing messages about how much God loves them because it can be difficult to accept. However, that changes when they experience an intentionality to connect with each kid present and allow smiles, hugs, and sincere love to bring hope to a community and to a people that fight to survive each day.

Hearing Pastor Eva explain that importance for us to donate our time and energy and allow ourselves to be used in an uncomfortable and challenging way, can





shine a light into someone's life that can build a lifelong dependence on our Lord, Jesus Christ.

I wish I could point to attendance or some other measurable outcome, but for me, it's persevering to trust in the Lord even when it's not apparent that much impact is being made. This Trust has helped us become an integral part of a community in a far-off corner of Monterrey, Mexico and be included in the wonderful gift of relationships that can only be obtained through responding obediently to the Lord.

Experiencing these God-ordained relationships and the unconditional love that we receive from these people brings a feeling of success. But it's not the same kind of success that we define and identify within our world back home. It's a success that seems to get recognize due to our intentionality to serve and love and our willingness to be used, which pleases the Lord!

#### **Going Deeper,**

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Similar to becoming a husband in 1997, I'd like to think that I am a stronger and better husband than I was when I started. However different and more effective as a husband today, I was still husband immediately beginning after saying "I Do" on that wonderful day of Nov. 29, 1997.

Over the years I have had some growth seasons as a husband and (probably) some seasons that were not so memorable. However, I was a husband. I believe that it is similar in being a disciple and that going deep in the discipleship process is essential once becoming a disciple.

As I continue to discover, that going deeper with men is the path to impacting

more people. As men grow their relationship with Christ, those involved with that person are impacted resulting in a broader impact.

From the parable of the sower as described in the Gospel of Luke, chapter 8, we are told of four different seeds being planted, but it is the fourth seed that sustains bearing fruit and multiplying. Luke mentions that the fourth seed is planted in good soil allowing it to grow, etc.

Through the discipleship process, I have found that my focus is helping cultivate the soil so that fourth seed men can be grown. My passion continues to be helping men to not become 1st, 2nd, or 3rd seeds as described in Luke. Most always, my focus is helping men dig deeper in their relationship with Christ. As you can imagine, this process can take years, but it is essential in being a

disciple

For we disciples are called to bear fruit. And bearing fruit is about one's identity in Christ that results in abiding. And "Abiding" is the soil of the 4th seed!!!

So, when talking about cultivating one's soil, my greatest desire is to help other disciples grow deeper in their dependence on Christ in such a way that reflects what is captured in John 3: 30, "He must become greater, I must become less." This can only happen as you grow in knowing our Father and His Son, Jesus.

So, as you think about your discipleship process, know that the end-goal is NOT becoming a disciple, for this is only the beginning. The discipleship process is about impact. Going deeper with your Savior so others will be impacted by Him!
